Women excelled at balancing school and life

Students in the MSW Program juggle multiple responsibilities -- jobs, caregiving, classes, and field placements. Emily Delaplane and Kelly Smack, honored as this year's Outstanding

Graduates demonstrated excellence inside and outside of the classroom.

Delaplane attended classes full-time, commuting to West Chester from the

Ronald McDonald House of Delaware, where she lives and works as the resident manager. She also has a part-time position as a recovery specialist at the Rockford Center psychiatric facility, where she was hired after her first-year field placement. Delaplane completed her second field placement at Nemours / Alfred I duPont Hospital for Children.

She plans to be a medical social worker after graduating this spring. Her experience at the Ronald McDonald House, where families stay while their children are being treated at local hospitals, illustrates how all segments of society interact with the health care system.

"We have one family from India and one family from Illinois, and their kids have the exact same rare diagnosis," she says. "I love to show people how much stronger they can be after going through this."

Kelly Smack worked in behavioral health and case management for more than a decade before she started her master's degree at WCU's Philadelphia campus. Her goal was to achieve the education needed advocate more effectively for her clients.

The mother of two young daughters attended classes part-time. Her field placements were at the <u>United Way of Greater Philadelphia and Southern New Jersey</u> and the <u>Joseph J. Peters Institute</u>.

Smack's mother and sister died within five months of each other while she was in graduate school, and she took some time away from classes to attend to her family. The MSW Program faculty encouraged her to take the time she needed.

"I'm just so grateful," Smack says. "I was able to be a human and make real-life decisions."

She plans to use her MSW to work in schools in Philadelphia. Her family moved to the city when she was a child to take advantage of excellent schools, she says, and she wants today's children to have the same opportunities.
