Title: Examining support for LGBTQ individuals in the US and across the globe: A focus on the religious, economic, and racial/ethnic context of where people live.

Public opinion about homosexuality varies substantially across the United States and the world. While residents in some parts of the world have embraced gay rights as human rights, people in many other places find homosexuality unacceptable. Drawing on survey data from people living within the United States and across the world, Professor Adamczyk argues that country-level differences in democracy, economic development, and religion are the key forces shaping these attitudes. In the United States, she examines the role of religious affiliation and beliefs on influencing attitudes on homosexuality among African Americans.
