Pete Earley is best-known for his nonfiction book, CRAZY: A Father's Search Through America's Mental Health Madness, which was one of two finalists for the 2007 Pulitzer Prize.

His book chronicles his struggle to help his adult son after he develops a severe mental illness and is arrested. His son's arrest prompted Earley to spend ten months inside the Miami Dade County jail as a reporter where he followed prisoners with mental disorders through the criminal justice system to see what actually happened to them. His book has won awards from the American Psychiatric Association, the National Alliance on Mental Illness, Mental Health America, and prompted CNN to name him one of nation's top "Mental Wellness Warriors."

He currently serves as the parent member of the Interdepartmental Serious Mental Illness Committee (ISMICC) created by Congress to advise it on federal mental health policy. He was invited by President Obama to speak at a White House summit about his son's illness and recovery.

A former Washington Post reporter, Earley has appeared five times before the U.S. Congress to testify about the need for mental health reform, has spoken in 49 states and addressed legislators in four foreign countries. He serves on the board of the Corporation for Supportive Housing, which finances projects to eliminate homelessness. He writes regularly for USA TODAY and the Washington Post about mental health issues and also posts a weekly blog at www.peteearley.com that often is cited by the media.

In a Washingtonian Magazine cover story entitled, Top Journalists: Washington's Media Elite, Pete Earley was described as one of a handful of journalists in America who "have the power to introduce new ideas and give them currency."

He is the author of eleven nonfiction books and ten novels, including five New York Times bestsellers. His book Family of Spies: Inside the John Walker Spy Ring, was a five hour miniseries shown on CBS television. For his book, The Hot House: Life Inside Leavenworth Prison, Earley spent a full year as a reporter inside a maximum-security prison. His book, Circumstantial Evidence, helped free an innocent man from Alabama's death row and won the Robert F. Kennedy Award for Social Justice.

Chief Holland – Police Chief of Downingtown Borough/President of Chiefs Association: Started his police career on November 05, 1997 at the Downingtown Borough Police Department. After serving four years as a Patrol Officer he tested and was promoted to the rank of Sergeant. After serving as a Sergeant, for seven years, he then tested and was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant. In 2017, he was promoted to Chief of Police.

David Klein – Director of Admissions and Regionalization at Brandywine Hospital: Mr. Klein has 22 years' experience as a MH professional in Chester County, 11 of those years in a supervisory capacity. Dave is actively working to improve areas of patient care at Brandywine and within the Tower Health Behavioral system. He is responsible for admission services as well as strategic behavioral health planning within Brandywine and Tower as well as partnerships and behavioral health collaborative within Chester County.

Sonja Kenney - Clinical Manager of Crisis Services: Sonja Kenney, Psy.D. is the Clinical Manager of Crisis Services at Valley Creek Crisis Center. Sonja has been working at Valley Creek in various capacities since 2015. Sonja has 30 years of community mental health experience, providing direct care, supervision, coordination, and clinical consult to oprograms including NAMI, family support services, adult case management, adolescent and adult residential programs, IOP, partial hospitals, and individual, family, and group outpatient services.



PERSISTENT TRAUMATIC STRESS DISORDER: ADDRESSING RACIAL TRAUMA AND THE IMPACT OF MENTAL HEALTH

DR. EBONY WHITE OCT. 8 CANCELLED



Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) is a mental health diagnosis characterized by intrusive thoughts and feelings that impede functioning after experiencing or a traumatic event. This presentation addresses the question, what if it's not post? Black and Brown people in America, especially those residing in under-resourced communities in which violence is often a byproduct of poverty, have long exhibited symptoms associated with PTSD. However, there is no current diagnosis that honors this experience, and therefore no treatment that adequately serves to address this experience. In this presentation, persistent trauma associated with race as well as effective assessment and counseling methods are discussed.

Dr. White is an Assistant Clinical Professor in the Department of Counseling and Family Therapy and the Program Director of the Master in Addiction's Counseling program at Drexel University. As the Executive Director of the Center for Mastering and Refining Children's Unique Skills (MARCUS), a non-profit organization, she focuses on expanding developmental pathways for at-promise adolescents in Trenton, NJ through counseling, mentoring, and tutoring. Dr. Ebony's research interests broadly focus on advocacy and social justice within the African American community. Specifically, she is interested in the impact of individual and systemic trauma on the development and functioning of individuals and families within the African diaspora nationally and globally. Her opinion is often sought out around topics of mental health, trauma, and racism and has been featured in numerous outlets including Newsweek, Medium, the Philadelphia Inquirer, PopSugar, and the New York Times, to name a few.

In 2007, Dr. Ebony received the Woman of the Year award from the Mercer County Commission on women. She also received the Community Service Award from the NJ State Federation of Colored Women's Clubs and the Carver Youth and Family Center in 2018. Dr. White is the 2021 recipient of the American Counseling Association's Dr. Judy Lewis Counselor for Social Justice award. She is the current Chair of the North Atlantic Region of the American Counseling Association and the incoming President-Elect of Counselors for Social Justice. She recognizes the village that raised her and lives by Ubuntu, "I am because we are, and because we are, I am."
