ABSTRACT

This study was conducted to define a way to distinguish sex positive countries and sex negative countries. Sex positivity is defined through a feminist ideology and consist of many different aspects of life. If sex positivity is promoted then many communities that include women, LGBT, and sex workers can live safer and healthier lives. Fifteen countries in Europe were chosen as the subjects of this study. To create a ranking of these countries both policies and demographics were studied.




Results

Aspects of the Ranking to note:

- Countries considered the most developed are actually sex moderate
- Countries with a strong religious standing fell hard;
 except Ireland
- As shown in figure 2 the majority of the countries are clustered together in relation to there ranking
- A former soviet state is the 2nd most sex positive country in this study



Conclusion

- Even with the rankings each country could still improve their sex positive policies to create even safer environments
- Religion seems to play a big part in whether or not a country can even get polices passed
- Each country needs to improve on missing data such as no record on sex workers and the actual population of LGBT
