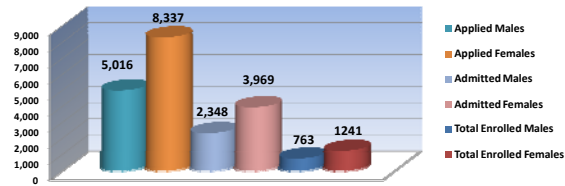

Estimated Expenses for a Full-time Undergraduate Student



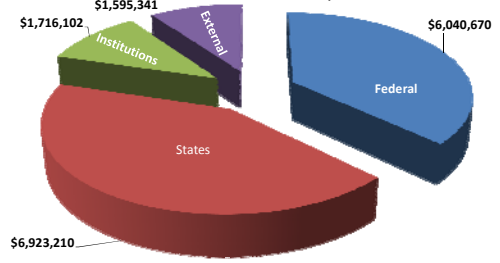
