For example, if a program requires that a student earn a B or better in a major program requirement, then the student requesting transfer credit from another institution must have earned a minimum of B in the parallel course. If a student earns a lower grade than the requirement, the department may require the course to be repeated at West Chester University. If a student changes his or her major, grades originally approved for transfer will be re-evaluated by the new major department.

No course equivalency transfer credit will be given for WCU courses numbered at the 400 level, unless the courses are taken at an institution that grants a baccalaureate degree. Departments have the right to accept courses for their majors as XXX 199 or TRN 199 credits.

Transcripts will be evaluated by the Office of the Registrar following acceptance. Students will be sent a copy of their Transfer Credit Evaluation prior to the deposit due date.
