This presentation demonstrates six key practices in Zoom that faculty can utilize to create an engaged community: Huddles, problem-based learning, role-plays, multimedia, freeze-frame, and exit interviews. Student evaluations will also be present. Faculty will learn six best practices to use to engage students in their Zoom classes and create an active learning community. These practices are transferable to various subject areas.
