Committee or Organization	Description
Athletic Advisory Board	The Athletics Advisory Board serves as a review and advisory body to the President of West Chester University. The Board will work closely with the Vice President for Student Affairs and the Director of Athletics assisting with the development of University's Athletics Program. It is made up of 7 faculty members, 6 administrators and three students. Each college or schools has one representative on the board who can serve as a "go to" person with questions about athletics and/or student-athletes. The Board is chaired by the NCAA mandated Faculty Athletics Representative (FAR), Dr. Craig Stevens who is also the chair of the Department of Kinesiology. The FAR's responsibilities include overseeing the well-being of student-athletes and acting as a liaison between academics and athletics. Please contact him with any questions or concerns regarding student-athletes and their academic performance.
APSCUF Faculty Union	The Association of Pennsylvania State College and University Faculties (APSCUF) is your union. APSCUF represents all faculty, classroom and non-classroom, both tenured and tenure track, as well as adjuncts. Resources offered to faculty include class presentations about the benefits of service-learning, sample syllabi, publication information, syllabi assistance, teaching materials, and assistance with creating collaborative partnerships with community agencies. WCU defines academic service-learning as a teaching method that combines community service with curricular goals as it focuses on critical, reflective thinking, and civic responsibility. Service-learning courses involve students in organized community service projects that address community needs, while developing their academic skills, sense of civic responsibility, and commitment to the community. West Chester University is a member of the PA Campus Compact and is proud to be awarded the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll. Additionally, a staff member from the Center for Trans and Queer Advocacy and a faculty member work in collaboration to co-chair a university- wide LGBTQIA+ University Caucus. The mission of the caucus is to promote the equity, empowerment, and success of LGBTQIA+ students, faculty, and staff by fostering a safe campus environment; developing, suggesting, and supporting inclusive policies and curriculum; supporting LGBTQIA+ recruitment and retention initiatives; and promoting social and educational opportunities to meaningfully engage with the University community. It is involved in projects such as advising training, administering advising awards, development and maintenance of the university advising website, and increasing visibility of advising on campus, by attending New Faculty Orientation and other events.

Committee for Excellence and Learning in Teaching (CELT)	The mission of the Committee for Excellence in Learning and Teaching (CELT) includes fostering collaborations among faculty and with students to build a scholarly community around issues of teaching and learning. With members from all areas of faculty and administration, CELT's goals are to enhance curricula and instructional modes to actively engage learners in connecting theoretical and applied knowledge and improve the quality of their learning. Programs sponsored by CELT include Book Discussion Groups, an annual early-summer Workshop on pedagogical topics, and CELT Professional Development Funds for teaching projects (funding up to \$2000.)
Distance Education Services	Office of Digital Learning and Innovation is a centralized office that supports the development, promotion, implementation, and assessment of distance education programs and courses, as well as digital learning at West Chester University. The office works closely with deans, department chairs, and faculty to expand existing distance education programs as well as identify and develop new programs. The office aims to enhance teaching and learning experiences by providing innovative pedagogical and digital strategies to WCU faculty, students, and administrators.
Faculty Mentoring Committee (FMC)	Building and sustaining a mentoring culture on a higher education campus has been shown to play a critical role in faculty retention and success. The Faculty Mentoring Program (FMP), established in 2008, is open to all part- time and full-time academic and administrative faculty, as defined by the most recent CBA. The FMP offers three targeted programs to support faculty at every career stage: new full-time tenure-track faculty, faculty desiring to seek promotion, and adjunct faculty. The mission of the program is to foster mentoring partnerships among faculty to enhance lifelong professional learning in teaching, scholarship, and service
Faculty Senate	The mission of West Chester University's Faculty Senate is to ensure faculty involvement in the shared governance of the institution. A forum for sharing, evaluating, and shaping institutional policies and other matters that affect the welfare of the University, the Faculty Senate is committed to fostering a climate that promotes the growth and development of faculty and students. Elected senators serve three-year terms and include representatives from each college/school, non-classroom faculty, and temporary/adjunct faculty, as well as at-large seats. Elections are held each spring, and many new senators first serve as a designated Senate proxy. All faculty members are welcome to attend Senate meetings, which are held three times per semester (typically on Friday afternoons).
