WCU's Sustainability-Focused Curricula

Do you teach a sustainability-focused course? If so, consider adding it to existing programs in sustainability. They include:

- 18 Credit Minors:
 - Interdisciplinary Minor in Sustainability and Resilience
 - Applied Community and Environmental Sustainability (ACES) Minor
- 12 Credit Certificate:
 - Sustainability Pathway Certificate. This certificate offers students the opportunity to schedule their general education courses with a concentration on sustainability. To be considered for the pathway certificate, courses must be part of the general education program, either a distributive (e.g., behavioral and social science) or an attribute (e.g., speaking emphasis) course.

The Gordon Natural Area (GNA) and WCU Campus Gardens are used for learning, research, and recreation. Brandywine Project Faculty Workshop

The <u>Brandywine Project Faculty Workshop</u> promotes sustainability-focused curriculum development.
