

What is Community-Engaged Learning?

West Chester University and the Center for Civic Engagement & Social Impact defines academic community-engaged learning as a teaching method that combines community service with curricular goals as it focuses on critical, reflective thinking and civic responsibility. Community-engaged learning differs from other forms of experiential education because it benefits both the service providers (i.e., students and faculty) and the recipients (i.e., community members).

Students benefit because community-engaged learning:

- o Creates academic, professional, and personal opportunities
- o Increases understanding of academic topics
- o Provides hands-on experience
- o Develops critical thinking and problem-solving skills

Faculty benefit because community-engaged learning:

- o Encourages interactive teaching and reciprocal learning between students and faculty
- o Adds new insights and dimensions to class discussions
- o Provides opportunities to tap into expertise of community agencies as co-teachers

- o Helps identify areas for research and publication related to current trends and issues Community partners benefit because through community-engaged learning partners:
 - o Gain access to university skill, knowledge, and resources
 - Have an opportunity to contribute to the educational process
 - o Play a strong role in solving pressing local needs

West Chester University benefits because community-engaged learning:

- o Enhances teaching, research, and outreach activities
- o Enables faculty and staff to become active participants in the community
- o Promotes positive community relationships and collaborations
- o Equips university graduates to develop creative solutions to today's most pressing issues

Getting started: Creating a Community-Engaged Learning Course

The Center for Civic Engagement & Social Impact offers resources to assist faculty with the creation of community-engaged learning courses through:

- One-on-one consulting around implementing and designing community-engaged learning projects
- Assistance in identifying community partners interested in collaborating with students and faculty
- Workshops and professional development opportunities
- ❖ A community-engaged learning resource library of journals, books, articles, sample syllabi, practitioner guides, etc.
- ❖ The Community-Engaged Learning Faculty Work Group, comprised of faculty from a range of disciples who promote community-engaged learning by engaging with new faculty who are interested in this teaching method. ❖ Participation in the Ram Corps Community Engagement Scholars program. Faculty apply to work with community engagement scholars who are paid to assist with support for new or ongoing community-engaged learning courses for 1 semester while the student community engagement scholars also participate in leadership training through CCESI.
